WATCH: Poison Garden

Hello, my Mighty Friend!

Recently, an Academy of Practical Homeopathy[®] student sent me a video produced by the BBC. The video is a tour of a unique feature in an English garden in Alnwick, Northumberland: a poison garden!



This garden is a homeopath's dream!

While the warning on their gates cries "THESE PLANTS CAN KILL," I bet Dr. Samuel Hahnemann would have added an addendum:

THESE PLANTS CAN CURE!

Enjoy this tour! You'll learn more about *Belladonna, Ruta* and *Hyoscyamus.* But around 3:51 in the video, the garden guide highlights one of our mainstay medicines, *Aconitum napellus*!

You'll hear what a deadly plant this is in the expert's words. But that also reinforces what a sweeping and valuable *medicine* it can become when homeopathically potentized.

This brings to mind a recent development that has triggered my concern.

If you own the "The Banerji Protocols" book, you might find that Aconitum napellus Mother Tincture is mentioned for a couple of conditions. However, Aconitum napellus θ (Mother Tincture or MT) is actually banned in the United States and Europe, so I've never had reason to address concerns about this form of Aconite.

But it's recently come to my attention that *Aconitum napellus* Mother Tincture has somehow snuck through the usual checks and balances and can now potentially be purchased from an unscrupulous foreign vendor.

So, now, I feel responsible to clarify:

We do NOT use the mother tincture form of the medicine Aconitum napellus.

A mother tincture can be safe for the layperson or general public to use medicinally when made from a *non*-poisonous plant. But as you just learned from this video, *Aconitum* is poisonous in its gross form.

So, to that end, let's not take any chances. Turn in your Banerji Protocols book to pages 65, 135 and 139 right now. Then, next to the protocol containing "Aconitum Napellus θ " write, **"Do not use: POISONOUS!"** That way, if someone else in your current household or even someone down the line in the next generation who inherits your books reads this protocol, you will have made sure that they're forewarned with this information as well.

Yet please understand that the Banerjis knew what they were doing when they used this medicine! They had their own homeopathic manufacturers who created their mother tinctures to precise specifications. And obviously, a medicine such as this would have been meticulously supervised by the doctors.

The Banerjis wrote their book for fellow homeopaths, not laypeople. If they had known nonprofessionals would widely adopt their book, I am confident they would have included a forceful cautionary statement.

But isn't it fun to see the gross form of these toxic plants? Especially because we know the therapeutic effects these plants can possess when homeopathically prepared — diluted, succussed, potentized!

This is truly God's medicine!
