I bet that got your attention. It got mine.

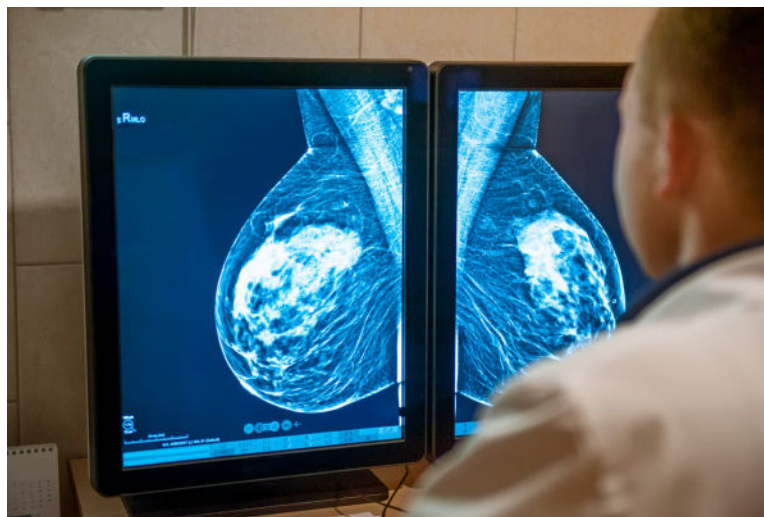
Overdiagnosis and false positives from mammography are creating an 84% higher rate of death from breast cancer.
